

'I'll be worthy when I lose weight.'

'I'll be worthy when everyone thinks I'm a good parent.'

'I'll be worthy when he calls back and asks me out.'



Most of us have our own version of the above; that elusive something that will make us more 'worthy' of the love, respect and attention of others.


In her wonderful book 'The Gifts of Imperfection', Brené Brown introduces what she calls Wholehearted Living.

"Wholehearted Living", she writes "is about engaging in our lives from a place of worthiness. It means cultivating the courage, compassion, and connection to wake up in the morning and think, no matter what gets done and how much is left undone, I am enough."

In the book she lists ten guideposts for this Wholehearted Life, which include authenticity, self-compassion, resilience, gratitude, creativity, rest and play, stillness and meaningful work. Online, you can fill in a questionnaire which provides a helpful inventory of each of the guideposts, and reflects back to you those things you're letting go of and those you're cultivating (<https://brenebrown.com/wholeheartedinventory/>)

Jesus once said that he came to bring 'life in all its fullness' or wholeness. And his own life was the greatest example of Courage,

Compassion and Connection. He lived out of that place of worthiness, and in that final week of his life, he showed us just how worthy we are; worth dying for.



In this season of Lent, you might like to fill in the Wholehearted Inventory and ask yourself what area of my life should I especially cultivate in this spring-cleaning season for the soul?

This Lent, may we each make time and space to nurture and nourish those things that help us flourish; that lead us to life in all its wholeness.



Join a thousand other pilgrims from across St Albans Diocese to celebrate the risen Christ at St Albans Cathedral.

Every year hundreds of people from across the diocese and beyond journey together to St Albans Cathedral for an Easter celebration. Some walk from their home church, some drive or cycle, some walk or get a bus or lift-share from a hub church.

Gather on the grass in front of the cathedral with your picnic, before heading into the cathedral from 2.30pm for an informal service of Holy Communion from 3pm led by Bishop Jane, during which we'll sing together and hear some excellent short Easter reflections. Dogs are welcome and most of us sit on the floor, although chairs are available if you'd prefer that.

How can I get involved?

You can just show up on the day with your friends but it would be really helpful for planning if you could register via the **St Albans Diocese** website to let them know you're thinking of coming. By registering you can receive the locations of hub churches from which you can travel to the Cathedral together.

Joint Church Away Day on Sunday 14th April

This year's joint Church Away Day for St Andrew's and St Mary's is approaching fast!

We'll be gathering as sister churches at St Joseph's in the Park School, Hertingfordbury (off St Mary's Lane, beside St Mary's Church).

Those of you who have come along to previous Away Days will know just what a special time this is to worship, reflect, create and play together. In their feedback from other years, people wrote **'perfect', 'excellent', 'fabulous!', 'very special', 'It felt like God was with us throughout the day', and 'An altogether rich, warm, welcoming and deeply-valued day'**

Wholehearted

This year's theme is 'Wholehearted', based around an incredible book by Brené Brown called 'The Gifts of Imperfection'.

Brené Brown defines wholehearted living as *'engaging with our lives from a place of worthiness. It means cultivating Courage, Compassion, and Connection to wake up in the morning and think, no matter what gets done and how much is left undone, I am enough. It's a deeply held belief that we are inextricably connected to each other by something greater than us.'*

She lists ten guideposts for wholehearted living and you're welcome to complete a short questionnaire ahead of the day:

We'll be exploring how Wholehearted Living connects with what Jesus said about **'life in all its fullness'** (John 10. 10).

What to expect at the Away Day

The day will start with coffee at 9.15am, and then a short introductory all-age session with worship, followed by some deeper reflection for the adults and separate activities for the children and young people.

There will be a range of exciting workshops (we've already confirmed the always popular singing workshop, Pilates and Mindful Walking).

We'll then have a hot lunch (cottage pie/veggie option, apple crumble and custard), some free time and we'll finish the day with a Eucharist for all ages. The day will end with coffee at 3.30pm.

Please note that there won't be a 9.15am service at St Mary's or a 10.30am service at St Andrew's that day. There will be a short 8.00am service at St Andrew's.

We do hope you will be able to join us at this local venue for what should be a fantastic time away together as sister churches.



Meeting people in groups, where everyone shares their thoughts and experiences, lies at the heart of The Bible Course as everyone learns from each other.


Thirteen of us took part in this course in the autumn and found it really helpful and enjoyable.

Waste not, want not

Jenny Mutch, Chair of the eco-church committee, offers some food for thought

It's Lent and traditionally we ask ourselves the question 'what are we going to give up?'. This is often an opportunity to be a little self-centred and give up types of food that we know are bad for us but we can't resist. For me this year, it's processed sugar, so if you see me going for a biscuit – shout "NO Jenny!"

Anyway, this got me thinking about food wastage! Do you know how much food is thrown away each year in the UK?



100 million pints of milk tipped down the drain!

50 million chickens in the bin

TESCO Extra 240,000 tonnes of supermarket food wasted.

10 billion tonnes of wasted food every year, the equivalent of 790,000 double decker buses!

AND 32% of all food wasted is our daily bread!

Figures may vary a bit depending on source

That's a lot of wasted food! It's clearly not fair on those who don't have enough to eat. It's also a waste of the world's resources and adds to the UK's carbon footprint through the manufacturing, distribution and disposal process.

How much do you throw away? Next time you throw food away, ask yourself: is there anything else I can do with this? Is it just a bit stale or shrivelled rather than not edible?

What about the following for ideas for your dry but still edible bread?

- ✓ Add to soups for thickening. Ribollita is a rustic Italian soup with beans, vegetable and bread; it will be on our menu next time we have spare bread!
- ✓ Turn it into crispbreads with olive oil and pop it in the oven then add your favourite toppings; works a treat!
- ✓ Simply sprinkle water and reheat in the oven; one to try.

I am sure you have much better ideas, so why not let us all know – perhaps add your favourite idea in the next magazine edition.

Like many churches, St Andrew's actively pursues the priority of seeking to engage our local community. We want people to come into the church building, feel a sense of welcome and realise the reality of the statement (on our website) that "no one belongs here more than you".

Before Covid came amongst us, we decided to run the occasional folk concert featuring high profile names who would attract an audience. Folk music appealed because we felt there was a gap in the local market and because having solo singers and/or small sized bands was going to be much easier to organise than big bands with excessive technical demands. In those early days, we quickly discovered that folk artists are used to playing in church buildings, enjoy our acoustics and respect the space with its opportunities and limitations. We are not a commercial theatre, we rely on our church members as volunteers and toilet facilities are very limited!

As with so much else across society, March 2020 brought a nasty interruption to our work. Planned events had to be cancelled and, for the next couple of years, it was hard to organise anything with certainty. However, we have come through those difficult times and now have organised a succession of successful, often sold-out gigs. Artists such as Fairport Convention, Ralph McTell and Cara Dillon have graced the building and offered enrichment and enjoyment to our audiences (nb. we even had visitors from the U.S.A. whose

tour of Europe was organised to fit with the specific date of Martin Simpson's gig - we offered them front row seats!).

To make a success of the gigs has required support, team work and lots of learning. We have relied greatly on Pat, a near neighbour of the church with a passion for folk music and a generous heart, to help out with PA and tech requirements - we could not have undertaken the programme without him. Tickets sales through Ticketsource work beautifully, coping with re-funds and providing confirmation of ticket income for artists' agents when it comes to settling final payments. Also, we set up a St Andrew's Folk newsletter which currently has nearly one hundred recipients and is sent approximately every month.

An important attraction is a licensed bar which operates before the show and at the interval, with soft drinks, wine and real ale from a local brewery (thank you to John at New River Brewery). It took us a long time to realise that we should refer to it on our publicity - people were not expecting refreshments and often went to the nearby pub pre-show. Now they come to the church for their drink and while, for many, consuming beer in a church pew came as a culture shock, after a few years' experience, they are getting used to it!

Talking to the musicians has helped us understand the demands of touring and how they appreciate a warm welcome and hospitality (something they do not always experience). The offer of a cup of tea, some cake and a warm meal makes a huge difference and has led to St Andrew's becoming known on "the circuit". Indeed, in the past year, we have been asked for gigs by musicians and their agents who have heard good

things about us. One consequence of this has been reaching a point where we may have to say "no" to an artist because we cannot make excessive requests to our pool of volunteers who give their time so generously to ensure the events are successful.

However, undoubtedly, our music programme (which also includes Beer and Carols at Christmas and Harvest Fest in October), has brought together a great team from our worshipping community. They enjoy offering the hospitality, working together and seeing the enjoyment of performers and audience alike. We all feel part of something quite special.

Risk assessments, evacuation plans, first aid provision and marketing all need to be prioritised. However, with bands booked into 2025 and the prospect of welcoming high profile folk artists such as Spiers and Boden, Julie Fowlis and Gigsparner, there is a lot to look forward to. It is important that everyone in the church community (not just those most involved in organisation) recognise the role of the music programme in the life of St Andrew's. Prayer and encouragement help to make it work and if it didn't exist, in many ways, we would be much the poorer!

Alone in the world of traditional folk music

Fobes Mutch reviews the concert given by Eliza Carthy and Jan Reid

In early January, the north of England came to St Andrew's in the musical form of two outstanding solo folk singers. It was a memorable concert.

First up was Jennifer (or Jen) Reid. Speaking in her broad Lancashire accent, she introduced herself as the purveyor of 'Victorian broadside ballads and Industrial Revolution work songs'. Asking her later what a 'broadside ballad' was, she described the genre as 'descriptive of narrative songs, sung in simple ballad form, on a popular theme,



which used to be printed on broadsides for sale in the streets in the nineteenth century'. Jen is widely respected as a musical historian, collecting most of her material from Cheetham's Library and the Working-Class Movement Library in Manchester. Her pedigree as a performer includes supporting performance-poet John Cooper Clarke and Jarvis Cocker's Sheffield band Pulp. She may also be recognised as playing the character of Barb in Shane Meadows' TV period drama *The Gallows Pole*.

She really is a 'solo' performer, singing unaccompanied with a powerful, beautifully belligerent voice. Her themes are about mills, mines and working-class people, having fun at fairs and wakes' week outings, or struggling with poverty, hunger and disease. Her half-hour set takes the audience on a musical tour of Lancashire, with songs from Rochdale, Burnley, Nelson, Oldham and Salford Bridge on a Saturday night. Despite the grim background to many of her songs, her performance is brought alive by a depreciating sense of humour

and a genuine passion for the music of old.



After Jennifer, comes Eliza Carthy. Due to play a gig in the church with her well-known singer-songwriter father Martin Carthy last year, they had to

pull out of that appearance due to illness. Eliza couldn't wait to make up for that disappointment and requested a slot at St Andrew's as part of her spring tour.

Despite her status as one of Britain's finest folk singers and musicians, Eliza is relaxed and friendly before going on stage. We chat in the vestry over portions of delicious lasagne and compare our names. I tell her the history of the name Forbes Robertson Mutch and she responds with delight to say that her full name is Eliza Amy Forbes Carthy. Could we be related, we laugh?

Hailing from Scarborough in North Yorkshire – the other side of the Pennines to Jen Reid – both singers are inspired by traditional folk music and nineteenth century ballads. The difference is that Eliza is more experimental and accompanies herself on the fiddle. She is also known to play the viola, melodeon, piano, guitar, tenor guitar and ukulele. The phrase 'talented musician' is an understatement. She has been performing since she was 13 and has conquered the world of folk music, with a long list of awards and prestigious collaborations with other folk celebrities, including Nancy Kerr and Jon

Boden. In the BBC Radio 2 Folk Awards one year, she won 'Folk Singer of the Year', 'Best Album' (for *Anglicana*) and 'Best Traditional Track' (for *Worcester City*, from the same album). In 2014, she was awarded an MBE for services to folk music in the Queen's Birthday Honours.

Her set that evening covered a huge canvas of music, ranging from the aforementioned ballads to songs from what she describes as a 'barrack room folk opera' *The Transports* by Peter Bellamy; from a collaborative album with American banjo player Tim Eriksen, to songs that she composed for Shakespeare's little-known play *The Two Noble Kinsmen* at The Globe theatre in London. Featuring two fiddle virtuosos, this complex tune is the highlight of the evening. She finishes with a rendering of her most famous solo track, *Worcester City*, which she humorously describes as a 'typical folk tale about murder'.

Stripped back and minimalist compared to many of St Andrew's folk events, the concert is, nonetheless, a perfect example of the talent that exists on the British folk scene at the moment and another demonstration of the church's pulling power as a first-class venue.

Don't forget to book your tickets for Martin Simpson on 14th March, and Julie Fowlis on Thursday 30th May. John Spiers & Jon Boden's concert on Tuesday 16th April is sold out.


