

WALKING EACH OTHER HOME

It was wonderful to see former Leeds Rhinos team-mates Rob Burrow and Kevin Sinfield awarded OBEs in the New Year's Honours list. This was in recognition of their fundraising to combat motor neurone disease which Rob was diagnosed with in December 2019, just two years after retiring from professional rugby.

Kevin recently completed a 7 in 7 in 7' challenge where he ran 7 marathons in 7 cities in 7 days. For the Leeds Marathon, Sinfield pushed Burrow in a wheelchair, stopping just before the finish line, to carry his friend across in his arms. It was a beautiful and tender moment.

Many of you will know the poem 'Footprints' which speaks of those moments in life when, at our weakest, Christ carries us. I actually believe that's something we're all called to do. To quote Ram Dass, 'we're all just walking each other home'.

Few of us will run marathons or fundraise millions for charity. All of us, however, can walk or carry each other home through not-so-small acts of kindness, through our full and loving attention, through shared laughter and tears, through our prayers.

As you look back over the scenes of your life, give thanks for those who walked alongside you and those who carried you when you couldn't walk.

We meet to deepen friendships, offer support, explore questions, unpack the Bible, pray together and grow in love for one another and for God. A new tale for Epiphany

St Matthew's brief narrative of the visit of the Magi swoops down into the Gospel story out of nowhere, delivers its gifts and then vanishes into the desert night, leaving far more questions than answers. No other Gospel includes the story, no other New Testament passage makes reference to it. Perhaps that is why so many colourful traditions and so much creative art – music, poetry and painting – have tried to give names and flesh and blood and breath – and crowns - to these nameless strangers.

Here is my contribution, the imagined reflections of a university academic in what we now know as Iraq, writing around what we would now call the year 30, Common Era.

"The memoir of Orodes, son of Melchior, Professor of Astrology, University of Susa in Parthia.

My late father was a respected scholar and I am proud to have followed in his footsteps. But one troubling incident always cast a question mark over his reputation. As a child I remember the time my father went away. It was 30 years ago now. He had been working on a treatise on moving stars out in the western sky, when suddenly he requested a Sabbatical, permission to leave his regular duties for 6 months and travel west to Jerusalem.

I remember well how I missed my father in those months, and I remember my mother's anxiety, especially when he did not return at the expected time. There was some scandal too, some controversy at the Faculty of Astrology. I realised how much it upset my father, but he never talked much about it. All he told us children was a strange tale about a rare bright star in the western sky, an ancient prophecy in a strange language about a new King in a foreign land, an implausible encounter with an astounded carpenter and his wife and child in a town called Bethlehem, and a supernatural warning to take a different route home. It sounded like a fairy tale. What dreams and wonders were these? We were children then, we were used to fairy tales.

Thirty years have passed. Now I can access the records at the University, and I can see why there was controversy. Why had three senior members of the Faculty all taken a long Sabbatical at the same time? Why was nothing ever written? No scholarly papers were published to tell what they had learned on their travels, there was no correspondence with their fellow academics at the Astrology College in Jerusalem.

There was some trouble with expenses. Expensive last minute rebookings of tickets, lodgings taken for a return journey that took a strange detour instead of the usual planned route. There were three particularly big payments for 'gifts' and nobody could quite explain who they were for, and what happened to them.

There was a diplomatic issue too. This was back in the days of Herod the Great, when the Kingdom of Judea still had a degree of independence. Dad and his friends had followed the protocols when they arrived, and presented their credentials at the Palace, but at the end of the trip they had just sneaked off into the desert without a word of farewell. There had been protests at government level. Our own government had removed certain records from the University archives, and declared the whole thing 'sensitive'.

What has my father been doing? How did any of this tie in with that magical, starlit tale of my childhood memories?

This year, something new happened in the sky. It should not have happened, our studies of the paths of the stars did not forecast it. A sudden, unexpected and total eclipse of the Sun tracked across the western desert and passed over the city of Jerusalem on a springtime Friday afternoon. Jerusalem! What wonders were these? Could this be a new chapter of my father's story?

But surely there was no new King there. Herod was long dead, and Judea was firmly under Pontius Pilate's Roman direct rule. Yes, Herod's son, another Herod, called himself King of Galilee, but he was a vacuous Roman puppet, the stars in the heavens would never align for a man like him. Where was the King whose birth my father had travelled to acclaim all those years ago?

So I too took my leave from my studies and travelled west. It was risky, with no visa and no plausible reason to travel. A friend advised me to time my arrival for Pentecost, a festival of pilgrimage for the Jews. Nobody would notice one more foreign tourist turning up. 40 days would be ample time for the journey.

And so I arrived in a busy and excitable Jerusalem, a strange and alien place for a Parthian like me, though I could get by with a bit of Greek and Aramaic. On a Sunday morning a group of prophets or preachers had gathered a crowd around them, and an unexpected and welcome sound caught my ear. A Judean was speaking fluent Parthian, and proclaiming a new King. Not the birth of a King, but a rebirth, a resurrection. A King who fulfilled the ancient prophecies, if only the people would see them in a new light. A King whose power came not on the edge of a sword, but in tongues of fire and winds of change.

Many of their listeners scoffed, but many believed. When that long day was over I sought out that preacher. His name was Matthew, a customs official. Perhaps he has learned his Parthian down on the eastern frontier, where our merchants came up through the Jordan valley. He told me his story, all he knew of an amazing Galilean, a carpenters lad called Jesus who had turned his life on its head, and who now had turned death itself on its head.

And in turn I told him my father's tale, and he listened, astonished, and nodded his head. 'Born a King in Bethlehem...as our prophet foretold.'

So perhaps this was the beginning of the reign of the new King. This was the fulfilment of my father's journey. But now it was my journey, and this time there would be no going back home by another road. There was no going back at all. I was called to go onward, no longer following stars, but following a Saviour into a new Kingdom, a Kingdom that welcomed the whole world.

I sometimes wonder if Matthew remembered me, if he ever passed on the story I told him of my father's journey, of the star, the gold and frankincense and myrrh. Or did it just remain an old family tale to tell my own children one day – a tale of long ago and far away?"

The memoir of Orodes ends here.

And what of us, as our Christmas season, with its cheering lights and wondrous stories, slips into a New Year? Will you be going back, like the Wise Men of old, to where you were before, cheered but unchanged? Or will you now travel forwards, no longer to seek a child, but to follow a man, one who will lead us along a road sometimes hard and sometimes dark, until we too know the brightness of Easter morning's renewal and Pentecost's re-energising. If we make that journey we shall be changed, and there will be no thought of going back – not by any road.

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LATIN LINK & ANGEL TREE CENTRE

Jenny Aitken brings us an update from Julie Noble in Oruro, Bolivia on life in the country and her work at the Angel Tree Centre.

Julie Noble is part of the Latin Link American mission. Latin Link is an international community with a calling to love and serve God and our neighbour. Most members of Latin Link work in Latin American countries while some work with Latin Americans in other parts of the world. Angel Tree Centre works with prisoners' children and families.

Julie Noble has sent news of her work with Prison Fellowship in Oruro, Bolivia. She writes. 'There are now over eighty young offenders in the Renacer Centre (the majority for sexual abuse or rape) which present many challenges for the staff.

We finished the victim empathy course with fourteen boys in one class and four boys with learning difficulties in another. We held two end of year events. On 2nd December we organised games for the boys also ice cream sundaes and Christmas photos for everyone. On 6th December we held an afternoon tea and games party for the girls which they loved and said it made them feel like princesses.

On 15th December thirteen boys and one girl graduated high school at Renacer and there was a lovely celebration with about two hundred

visitors. The cook provided a delicious lunch which we eat outside in the courtyard.



We finished all but one of our restorative justice cases and presented reports to the judges. We were able to meet four boys we worked with at the end of 2022 (none of whom have been granted parole yet). It was good to see them continuing to make progress in accepting responsibility and awareness of the damage caused.

Meanwhile back at the Angel Tree Centre, thirty two children enjoyed a day out at the Discovery Park with a picnic, games and other entertainment provided by students from a local University. 2023 has been a difficult year for many reasons so please remember us in your prayers this new year'.

World Day of Prayer Friday March 1st

A mouse on the stair closes a fine year of folk music at St Andrew's

What makes a venue good for folk music? The acoustics need to be clear and highly regarded. A full-house capacity of 160 people is perfect – small enough to make the artists accessible to the audience, but big enough to attract top names in the business. A welcoming atmosphere with beer and wine and generous hospitality for the musicians will help create a sought-after destination. And a reputation for having a good time is essential. If you haven't guessed it yet, we're talking about St Andrew's church,

Over the past couple of years, St Andrew's has enjoyed concerts from national and internationally acclaimed folk artists and bands, including Ralph McTell, Martin Simpson, Cara Dillon and favourites Fairport Convention (twice). Take it from me, these are musicians who play to several thousand people at festivals and in venues such as the Royal Albert Hall. But they also like coming to St Andrew's... and, given all of the above, who can blame them?

At the end of last year, we enjoyed two special concerts.

The first was from Scottish singer-songwriter **Kris Drever**. Originally from Orkney but now settled in Glasgow, Kris brought a Scottish atmosphere to the church in November. He has made his name not only as a solo artist but also as a session musician on recordings by well-known artists, such as Kate Rusby, Eddi Reader and Julie Fowlis.

He is an exceptional guitarist, playing an amplified acoustic guitar in both a strumming and picking style. He was once described as playing with 'a highly individual blend of rhythm and harmony, folk, jazz, rock and country' although for us, he leaned heavily on the fiddle influence of his homeland. We heard a diverse range of songs about love, the seasons,

emigration and even the scuppering of the First World War German battle fleet at Scarpa Flow in 1919. It was a brilliant, virtuoso concert from the winner of several BBC Radio 2 Folk Awards. He was thrilled to play St Andrew's; St Andrew's was thrilled to have him.

Just before Christmas, we were entertained by the lively, energetic multi-instrumentalists known as **Churchfitters**

I know you're going to ask why they are called 'Churchfitters'. When asked, they say: Nobody knows! We're not fitters and have absolutely nothing to do with churches. The name's origin is lost in the mists of time but there is one aspect that suits us perfectly – quirkiness. Well, they had everything to do with our church in December and were definitely quirky. They played a fabulous two-hour set of original

and cover songs on a variety of instruments, including a banjo made from an old saucepan, a musical saw and their famous 'glass organ', a tray of wine glasses filled with different levels of water, played by rubbing the rim of the glasses to produce an ethereal sound.

They entertained us with a range of seasonal songs, including references to pantomimes, *The Holly and the Ivy*, *Good King Wenceslas* and, best of all (but not seasonal), *A Windmill in Old Amsterdam*, better known as A Mouse on the Stairs. Everyone in the audience joined in with the chorus.

Churchfitters closed a memorable season of folk concerts on the altar stage at St Andrew's in 2023. This year, Eliza Carthy has already made an appearance (review in the March magazine) and upcoming concerts include Martin Simpson, (John) Spiers and (Jon) Boden and Julie Fowlis. Tickets are on sale now through the church website.

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A LOOK BACK AT THE FESTIVE SEASON

BUMPER CHRISTMAS ATTENDANCES GENEROUS CONGREGATIONS



Christmas saw many more people entering the doors of St Andrew's to attend the various events and services held over the festive season.

Chrissy Barclay, with Rosemary Willis's help, had decorated the church gloriously. A beautiful Christmas tree lit the church too, thanks to a generous donor and Chris Seward's team who installed and decorated it.

For 'Beer & Carols' about 370 adults and children were welcomed through the doors over the course of the afternoon. Thev enjoyed the music of our wonderful house band 'Flare' which lead the carol singing. Rachel Chaplin and



Sam Chaplin added their voices to the occasion, whilst a huge group of children enjoyed covering their crafts (and most of the floor) with glitter. Mulled wine, beer and soft drinks were in high demand. A retiring collection for **The Hertford Pantry** raised £365.

<u>St Andrew's School</u> held their Christmas Carol Service in St Andrew's Church with 160 pupils and tremendous support from their families, more than doubling up last year's adult attendance to 166.

A beautiful candlelit service of <u>Lessons</u> and <u>Carols</u> was held on the Wednesday before



Christmas with about 125 attending, refreshed afterwards by mulled wine and mince pies – thanks to the Social Committee. A collection for **Herts Young Homeless** raised £400.

Christmas Eve saw two <u>Crib and Christingle Services</u> at which 465 adults and children received all of the Christingles that had been prepared – must remember to make extra next year. The collections at these services always go to **The Children's Society** and they will receive £600 towards their wonderful work.

Finally, the <u>Christmas Day Services</u> – Midnight Mass, 8am Christmas Day and the All Age on Christmas Day. We felt it appropriate that we should remember the Holy Land on this day and so our collection went to **Christian Aid's Middle East Appeal**, which will receive £545.

It was a joy to see so many people worshipping the Christ Child in so many ways and to witness people's generosity towards those in need.

DEANERY SYNOD

Growing Younger and More Diverse, Prayers of Love and Faith, Clergy Pay and New Housing

Shirley, who with Julie Markey, represents St Andrew's on Hertford & Ware Deanery Synod tells us what was discussed.

The Deanery

Hertford and Ware Deanery is a collection of parishes which stretches from Hunsdon and Widford in the east to Essendon in the west, from Ponsbourne in the South to Aston and High Cross in the North. Clergy and laity in the Deanery together have the responsibility for the mission of the church in the area.

The Deanery Synod

The Deanery Synod is the church governance equivalent of a district council. It comprises elected lay members from the parishes and serving clergy. Synod meetings act as a formal bridge between the Diocesan Synod and Parochial Church Councils.

We began with a presentation by Rev Dan Drew from the Diocese on 'Growing Younger and More Diverse'. He asked us to remember the people who had led us into faith in our childhoods and people who were always there at church or youth club week after week and who we could talk to about whatever we wanted.

He also talked about creating a space for children in our services so that they are a part of them.

There is a pilot scheme involving three primary schools, two CofE schools and one secular where another member of the 'Growing Younger and More Diverse' team is spending up to an hour a week with Year 6s getting them to think about the 'Rule of Life' and events in the Christian calendar eventually getting them to visit a church building with their parents.

Another strategy is for a group of about a dozen 18-35 year olds from various churches to meet regularly for a year sharing a meal, and ending up with an expedition – this year walking the Camino Way. We were asked if there were people in that age group who might benefit from being in a larger group like this as they are starting another cohort shortly.

We then received a report from Rev Rachel Wakefield on the General Synod of the previous week which spent most of its time discussing Prayers of Love and Faith – prayers for those in same sex relationships.

Concern was expressed by one clergy member of the Deanery Synod that there had not been discussion on the state of clergy pay. Their pensions have been cut from 75% to 50% of stipend and pay in real terms has declined by 10% in recent years. Curates are no longer eligible for Working Tax Credit under the new Universal Credit rules. He said that it was no wonder there is shortage of applicants for clergy posts if it had become a real struggle to survive.

There then followed elections for a new Lay Chair of the Deanery Synod (no one put themselves forward, so we will try again in March 2023), Treasurer (Janet Bird) and the Standing Committee (two of three laity elected).

The Deanery Synod is collecting information about new housing developments in the area, of which there are many, and what churches are doing to contact people newly moved in.



Think about... **LENT**

Lent is the time to prepare your heart and mind for Easter. It lasts for 40 days (not including Sundays) and begins on Ash Wednesday, which is on 14th February this year. At the Ash Wednesday service Christians are marked on the forehead with a cross of ashes as a sign of saying sorry to God for anything they have done that's wrong. The day before Ash Wednesday is called Shrove Tuesday, when it used to be the last chance to use up the food that would not be eaten during Lent (also known as pancake day!)

During Lent, Christians remember when Jesus went into the desert to fast and pray before beginning his work for God. OR people can decide to make an effort to DO something during Lent – perhaps read the Bible more, or do a different, meaningful, thing each day...maybe visit someone who may be lonely or fundraise for a local charity.



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BEWARE PHONE SCAMS

Police warn that phone scams are widespread in Hertfordshire

Hertfordshire Constabulary are warning residents to stay vigilant following reports of scam calls -please share this widely with friends and family.

Residents are contacted via 'phone by someone claiming to be a police officer investigating fraudulent activity on the victim's bank account. They claim there is an issue with their bank account and convince victims they are helping with a covert Police investigation.

The fraudsters typically provide victims with elaborate stories to justify the urgent need for cash withdrawal and convince their victims they are genuine, even telling the victims to call 999 OR 101 to check their identity but this is part of the scam as the telephone line can be left open by the scammer. Victims are manipulated into withdrawing cash and, posting it, or passing money to a courier arranged by the scammer.

Police recommend waiting at least five minutes before attempting to make a new call to ensure you're not reconnected to the offender, or use a mobile phone or test your landline by 'phoning a friend or relative first.

Senior Beacon Fraud Hub Manager, Elaine Crate, said: "Bogus Police telephone scams are increasingly common and elderly residents are being exploited. The effects of being scammed can be devasting, impacting not only your finances but also damaging your emotional well-being."

REMEMBER:

- The Police or your bank would NEVER ask you to withdraw cash or to move money to another account.
- Never share pin numbers or personal information.
- Speak with family or a friend before carrying out any actions.
- Use a different phone line to call your bank/Police.
- Stay vigilant and don't be afraid to end the call and hang up.

Please report to ACTION FRAUD (see below) if you or someone you know is a victim or contact the Police using methods shown at the end of this email. Action Fraud is the national reporting centre for fraud and cybercrime. They can be called on 0300 123 2040 (Monday to Friday 8am to 8pm) or via their website.

AMAZING GRACE: AMAZING PLAY

Forbes Mutch reports on a unique theatrical production at St Andrew's.

In January 1773, in a church in the English market town of Olney, the congregation sang a new hymn by their minister, written to illustrate his latest sermon. Two hundred and fifty years later, *Amazing Grace* has become the world's best-loved hymn and one of the most-recorded songs of all time.

Let's start at the beginning. In 1754, a 29-year-old John Newton was captain of a slave ship, ploughing the infamous triangular route between Liverpool and the Caribbean via the West Coast of Africa, where he picked up native slaves in chains. A decade later, he is an established curate in Olney.

Newton's journey from slave trader to evangelical Christian and slave abolitionist is remarkable and was brought to life vividly by the Living Breath theatre company in a play called *Forever Mine*, which was presented on the St Andrew's altar stage at the end of October 2023.

The story is told largely through Newton's lifelong correspondence with his wife Polly. In his letters, he chronicles his hardships as a slave trader at sea;

his growing distaste for the plight of his human cargo and his burning desire to become ordained in the church, following his conversion to Christianity.

The play is staged in front of a simple set with minimal props. This attention on the concentrates dynamic cast of four, led by Ellis J Wells as Newton and Susie Garvey-Williams as Polly. The audience is carried along waves on sympathetic emotion, love and righteous justice, as Newton's faith develops, his status as a writer of hymns grows in collaboration with poet William Cowper, and his links with



famous slave abolitionist, William Wilberforce fix his place in history.

The production was touring to mark the 250th anniversary of Newton's most-loved hymn, Faith's Review and Expectation, which has come to be known by its opening phrase, Amazing Grace. The play ends with the audience joining in a chorus of the hymn's first verse:

Amazing grace, how sweet the sound That saved a wretch like me. I once was lost, but now I'm found, Was blind but now I see.

Brilliant theatre – a moving, engaging and compelling drama.
