### **Environment Sunday**

Environment Sunday was on 19<sup>th</sup> October this year, and we decided that this would be a great opportunity to put together an exhibition about Eco Church.

It would concentrate on the five key themes:

- Worship and Teaching
- Our Buildings
- Nature and our Churchyard

- Lifestyle
- Community and Engagement

and show what St Mary's has been doing up to now.





We love nature at St Mary's and so there was a special focus on how to care for creation by making space for wildlife. Kath Oates and Nick Hoyle shared examples of habitats in their gardens — burrowing bees and slow worms! Juliet and Alastair Curry provided some amazing camera trap photos from the Clinton-Baker Pinetum at Bayfordbury. We'll be sharing these stories in later issues of the magazine.

We also shared project sheets for all ages on how to create mini ponds and bird feeders from recycled objects as well as tips for simple shifts to a more environmentally friendly lifestyle, buying FairTrade tea and coffee, for example, and eco friendly washing up liquid.

We hoped that as many people as possible would take some inspiration from what's been happening, and would make their own pledge to care for our planet.

### "Rewilding" by Rev Alan

#### This is a slightly edited version of Rev Alan's sermon on Environment Sunday

If you think back over your life, what have been some of your major cultural influences? An early one for me was that epic space opera from a galaxy far, far away; *Star Wars*! To say it was an obsession is probably an understatement. I spent all my pocket money on action figures and spacecraft, read books and got thoroughly lost in this science fiction multiverse. So, it was important, of course, to indoctrinate - sorry, introduce - my children to this tale of Jedis and Sith from a very young age.

Rosie, my daughter, sadly resisted, favouring *High School Musical* and *Lord of the Rings*. Thankfully, Elijah, my son, took up the mantle, and when the appropriate time came, I ceremonially handed over the custodianship of my precious collection. Now, that was both brave and risky. He was eight years old; he could potentially break them, lose them, trade them, forget about them. I had to trust that he would care for them, as I had so carefully over the years.

In the epic poem in Genesis, God does a far riskier thing. He entrusts the care of a whole planet to a race called humanity.

Now, I hope it goes without saying that these early chapters of Genesis were not composed to answer big questions like, 'How and when did this all begin?'. Clearly, it took a lot, lot longer than seven periods of 24 hours! Instead, the writers are much more interested in a much, much more important question; 'Why are we here?'.

Well, the rest of scripture and the history of humankind have been wrestling with that very question. I want to focus on a clue in Genesis that we are here to be custodians, caretakers of the earth.

More than that, this poem tells us that we are, in fact, part of the earth. There's that beautiful idea that we are created from the dirt and dust of the earth. And it is to this dirt and dust we finally return in that great cycle of carbon and atoms.

It's a reminder that we humans are interconnected with all of life. And, of course, we are the newbies. We have been around for 0.004% of the world's 4.5 billion-year history. And in that relative blink of an eye, we have not always lived up to that caretaking call. Our one species has polluted and destroyed countless habitats and ecosystems. In the last 500 years, our species has contributed to the extinction of nearly 1500 species.

Now, this isn't a sermon about what we need to do to save this planet; others are much better placed to speak into that. This, instead, is a sermon about how we might save ourselves by reconnecting, by restoring a spiritual intimacy with our sacred world. Notice I say 'sacred'. Richard Rohr, a Franciscan, calls the earth the 'Body of God', and argues that we need a shift away from this idea of human domination, of us being separate and superior to other life, to an understanding of relationship with the earth; to see ourselves as one with it. This is not just ecological but spiritual.

Now, that idea might make some of us twitchy. It's important, however, to distinguish between that which believes that God *is* the universe, and that which sees God as being *in* the universe and also beyond it. 'All is God' or 'all is *in* God'.

We need to rediscover the truth that we are divinely interconnected to this earth and to

the other species who also call this 'home'. I heard recently that New Zealand now defines its population as 695 billion, to include the country's wildlife population. That's a beautiful recognition of what I'm talking about.

You might have heard talk of a 'sickness of separation', an eco-anxiety, a sense of disconnect in our lives because we live so separately from nature. We need to rediscover our wild selves and our relationship with the wild. We need to rewild; get outdoors more, walk barefoot on occasion, get the earth under our fingernails, feel the wind on our faces; give our full and loving attention to this extraordinary natural world. Jesus, we know, would often withdraw to wild places like gardens and shorelines, mountains and deserts. I think we can all relate to that.

When I need perspective; when I need solace; when I need to feel rooted and reorientated, I walk in the woods and by the lakes near where I live. And I find that all that unhealthy introspection, and that overthinking begins to surrender to new rhythms as I look up and out. I begin to hear my true nature.

And this is not only about me and my wholeness. It is also about the wholeness of humanity. We are an increasingly disconnected and polarized species; us versus whoever; Left vs Right, religious vs humanist, Palestinian vs Israeli. And it's becoming crueller. Think for a moment of whose ideology or politics or faith you personally oppose. And now, say to yourself, 'They are part of me, and I of them'.

That is the shift we need if we are to build a more humane and sustainable and kind world. Violence to another, violence to the earth, is violence to me.

So, for the sake of ourselves, the sake of others, the sake of creation and the sake of God; spend more time reverently in this wild 'church not made with hands'. Look up with the soaring trees, be still with the quiet earth, wonder at the wonder and beauty of it all. Marvel at our place within it. Reconnect with the life-force that flows through all living things, take seriously our call to be stewards, caretakers and co-creators with God who is over all and through all and in all.



### Friends of Panshanger Park

Panshanger Park is a wonderful natural area within our wider community and so the Friends of Panshanger Park are sharing some of it's history - some of which will include the village and greens and some not.

This month Kate Harwood recalls the estate and contents sale in 1953 following the death of Lady Desborough the year before and the end of nearly 300 years of the Cowper family residence on the estate

### The Panshanger Clearance Sale

The death of Ettie, Lady Desborough on 28 May 1952 at Panshanger, marked the end of nearly 300 years of the Cowper family residence on the estate. Her three sons had predeceased her and neither of her two married daughters had any use for the old-fashioned property.

As happened with so many grand houses in the 1950s, the contents and the estate were put up for sale. The Sales Particulars of the 1953 land sale were hopeful: the property is eminently suitable for scholastic, institutional or other similar purposes. This was not to be; no-one wanted it at a time when so many other large properties were on the market.

Panshanger suffered the fate of so many houses and was demolished. The Second World War had wreaked havoc on these estates, with many heirs being killed, many staff dead or unable to return. The army and other requisitioners had left property in an appalling state, combined with lack of money (not least due to punitive inheritance tax levies) and materials and a change in society rendering many unwilling to return to service in big houses, left many estates unviable. At Panshanger the inheritance tax bill was £12,426 (the estate was valued at £406,685) due to it comprising significant amounts of agricultural land.

By 1955, one stately home was being demolished every 5 days and, it has been calculated, about 1000 disappeared between 1945 and 1965.

1458 acres of land had previously been sold to Ebenezer Howard for £51,000 to become part of Welwyn Garden City. Now another 3244 acres, in 51 lots, was put up for sale by Humbert & Flint at the Corn Exchange, Hertford in July 1953. These included 10 sets of allotments at Hertingfordbury, Letty Green, Cole Green, Staines Green and Birch Green, as well as the recreation ground in Hertingfordbury. The mansion house and parkland were split up into several lots and a number of cottages in Tewin and various farms were also sold off. The grand total realised for 2817 acres was £106,735 (over £4 million today). The house was sold for the value of its materials to a demolition contractor from Stoke Newington for £17,750 (c. £670,000).

In 1954 Lady Desborough's son-in-law, Julian Salmond, sold the Hertingfordbury Cowper Memorial Hall, on the road to Cole Green, to the East Hertfordshire Lodge of Freemasons, who re-named it Mayflower Place.

A number of Sales of the Contents were held over the course of 1953 and 1954; those of the particularly valuable items were entrusted to Christie, Manson and Woods Ltd (now

### The Panshanger Clearance Sale

Christie's) of London. These included the Italian sculptures, gold boxes, coins and objets de vertu. Some of the furniture and paintings were retained by the family but sales of objects from the house continued with a pair of ormolu wall lights of 1770, purchased by 5<sup>th</sup> Earl Cowper for Panshanger, being sold at Christie's in 1995. Other paintings made their way to the National Gallery such as the portrait of 1<sup>st</sup> Earl Cowper by Thomas Murray, sold in the Christie's 1953 sale. An earlier painting from Panshanger, the Small Cowper Madonna by Raphael, was sold by Lady Desborough in 1913 (to Duveen Bros of London, New York & Paris) to fund the installation of central heating at Panshanger and now hangs in the National Gallery in Washington.

The panelling, garden ornaments and other fixtures and fittings were sold from Panshanger itself having been removed before demolition. For example, 1000ft of 4 foot-high brick garden balustrading went for £52, and a stone garden lily pond and fountain for £60. A room full of rococo panelling including cornicing and a hidden door went for £24 with the matching fireplace with willow-pattern tiles for £28. Much of the panelling from the house was bought by Welwyn Garden City Development Corporation and incorporated in the new Panshanger development. Some items ended up further from home. We know of items at Fabdens in Thundridge, fire places in Hertford and Essex, etc.

Most intriguing of all is the fate of the wrought iron gates from Panshanger's North Lodge. These elaborate gates were described in Lot 744 as pair excellent ornamental wrot (sic) iron scrolled gates, dated 1893, 11'0" x 8' 0" together with 2 ditto wing gates, 6'6" x 4' 0". An attendee at the sale has noted that 'Each Carriage Entrance and Gate have the Cowper monogram with a Crown above the interlaced Cs'. And they went for the princely sum of £140. Fairly recently these have been discovered at Peterhouse College Cambridge, having been altered to fit their gateway.

The site itself was left uncared for. Part of the 87 acres sold with the house was subject to gravel extraction, and part retained as parkland. Later, in 1982, more extensive extraction was granted on appeal. Subsequent neglect has reduced the Conservatory and Orangery to mere shells, although the stables, converted to offices, have fared rather better. The industrial archaeology of the three linked water wheels with hydraulic rams and associated weirs has now all but disappeared. Efforts to encourage the restoration of these buildings and the significant (Grade II\*) landscape of Humphry Repton and Lancelot Brown have come

to nothing with 'restoration' being merely the infilling of some of the gravel pits, other being left as water-filled wildlife areas.

The 18<sup>th</sup> century ditty lauding the Cowpers and comparing them to the *Venerable Oak:* "In rural state superior may I stand / While COWPER'S offspring grace their native land" has sadly proved wrong with the Panshanger Oak, which was there before the Cowpers and their grand estate, outlasting both.

### Panshanger House, it's Rise, Fall and Reincarnation

#### Want To Know the Answers to these Questions?

Last month we advertised the talk given by Geoffrey Hollis about the Rise, Fall and Reincarnation of Panshanger House and posed some interesting questions. The answers are below.

Which Earl Cowper funded a laboratory for the Italian scientist Alessandro Volta (after whom the Volt was named)?

Answer: George, 3<sup>rd</sup> Earl. He started a Grand Tour of Europe in 1756 aged 18 and was expected to be away for two or three years but settled in Florence. There he lived for the rest of his life, despite being elected as an MP for Hertford in 1759.

Which occupier of Panshanger rowed in the Boat Race and across the English Channel, swam the Niagara rapids twice, and climbed the Matterhorn by three different routes? Answer: Lord Desborough whose wife Ettie inherited Panshanger following the death of her uncle, the 7<sup>th</sup> Earl Cowper.

What painting once hung in Panshanger but was sold in 1928 for the equivalent of £25m today and now hangs in the National Gallery of Art in Washington DC?

Answer: A painting by Raphael known as the small Cowper Madonna, bought by the 3<sup>rd</sup> Earl in Florence (see previous article)

Which owner spent the last five years of her life in two rooms of the House with the rest walled off?

Answer: Lady Desborough, before her death in 1952.

What important relic of Panshanger did Hertfordshire County Council buy with £500,000 raised by a public appeal in 1992?

Answer: The Panshanger Archive, containing estate and personal papers of the Cowpers and Desboroughs. At the time this was the largest sum ever paid by a County Record Office for a collection of documents.







#### WALTER WALLINGER CHARITY

Walter Wallinger died in 1709 leaving "Four hundred pounds for the placing of poor children of this Parish as Apprentices."

Times have moved on and the trustees of the charity now take the view that the income from the endowment should be used to give grants for educational purposes to people under 25 who have for at least two years lived, or been educated, within the ancient parish of Hertingfordbury which today roughly means Hertingfordbury village and the five Greens and outlying houses.

Something of the order of £1500 is available annually. Typically grants are one-off payments not exceeding £450 for something that will help with the applicant's education in a broad sense, such as a musical instrument, specialist equipment, a field or other course. Grants are available to anyone in school, FE or Higher Education.


