June Wighton 1931-2025

June was born in High Holborn, London on the 2nd June 1931. She was the second youngest of 13 children born to her loving parents Eleanor and Phillip. Nine survived to adulthood.

When June was very young, work for her father resulted in the

family moving to Briscoe Road in Hoddesdon, where she spent her younger years growing up in a happy household, even though this included the war years.

Due to the range of ages in the family, it was a very busy household with the comings and goings, sisters/brothers meeting partners and moving out of the family home. During her early working career, June was working at a wallpaper factory where she met a very handsome supervisor called Sid Wighton. Sid had just been demobbed from the Royal Navy on a Destroyer and was now back in civilian service.



They hit it off immediately and began courting. Even after her family moved again to Newtown Road in Bishops Stortford, some miles away, Sid used to visit June on his new BSA Gold Flash motorcycle and their relationship blossomed. They took trips to Cornwall on the Gold Flash most

weekends with their friends Anne and John.

They were married in March 1952 and moved into Sid's mother's house, a small

Victorian cottage in Forest Road Cheshunt. They had their first baby, Gary, in 1956. They lived upstairs in the house and, at the

time, had no running water upstairs and no toilet inside the house - a difficult time for them both, especially when Sid's brother George and his wife Violet were also living there in another part of the house. They lived like this for 6 years.

The Local Council were building a new estate in north Cheshunt and they received word of an opportunity for a new house in Montgomery Drive, which June was so thankful for. They had their next son Mark in 1958 and their last son Nigel in 1962. Many happy years were spent in Montgomery Drive, getting to know the neighbours and their children and they all became very close. June then found some part-time work nearby at Rochford's Nursery whilst the boys went through school, which was ideal when balancing the family demands.

After the boys left home, June and Sid followed Gary and Nigel to Hertford, acquiring a flat in Nightingale Court, North Road.

June found some work at the local doctors' surgery. She attended church each Sunday, helping with coffee mornings and soon had made many more friends.

June always embraced every activity attending regular weekly lunches with friends, joined a walking group, keep fit and even Thai Chi classes until she was



in her 90s, as well as her latest favourite activity, a weekly game of "Boggle" with her neighbour Maureen on a Sunday afternoon.

June was a grandmother to six children and a great grandmother to five, whom she all loved dearly.

June's faith was very important to her and always looked on the positives in life, with only ever a good thing to say about anybody. She had a very dry sense of humour that will be greatly missed.

She remained in Hertford living close to her son Nigel and his family, where she lived an independent life. Every evening, she would pour herself a "good half" glass of red wine to have after her dinner – this was clearly her secret to a long life!





CHILDREN

CHILDREN AT ST ANDREW'S

Children are never too young to come to church. You and your children are very welcome at St Andrew's. We realise that bringing children, especially babies and toddlers, to church can be challenging to say the least, so we have set aside part of the church (the Children's Corner) at the front of church (to the right of the altar) which is equipped with toys, books, craft materials and a space to call their own. Here, even if they are occupied with a toy or book, children absorb the atmosphere of worship.

Junior Church

During the 10.30am Parish Communion on Sundays in term time (except when there is an All Age service) there are activities for children in the St Andrew's Centre. The children will begin the service with the congregation and then, after the first hymn, they leave to join Junior Church.

All-Age Services

These are monthly, shorter, child-friendly, interactive communion services with songs and prayers which are held once a month: usually but not always on the second Sunday of the month. Children stay in church for the whole of the service.

Hertford Children's Choir is a choir led

by Rachel and Sam Chaplin for anyone aged 8-13 who loves singing and wants to develop their



musicianship. Rehearsals are on Fridays 5.30-6.45pm at St Andrew's Church Hertford and there are termly performances. See the church website for more information.

FOLK AT ST ANDREW'S

Them Northern lasses can certainly sing a song

The trees are changing colour, the nights are closing in and it's time to seek some autumnal cheer. Where better to find it than a comfy concert at St Andrew's. **Forbes Mutch** reports on celebrated folk duo Chris While and Julie Matthews.



When folk enthusiasts take their beer and lean by the pub fire and start talking about great bands and singers, it isn't long before the names Chris While and Julie Matthews are mentioned. These two singers have played with some of the greats; have won numerous awards and have been playing together as a duo for over 30 years. Their combined strength lies in the intimacy of their voices, the clarity of their songwriting and the emotional, Northern honesty they bring to every song. Chris was born in Barrow-in-Furness and Julie is from Sheffield.

They don't pull their punches up north, you know, so it's not surprising that their first song at St Andrew's, called Seventh Wave, contains the lyrics Let's throw a little light in here, even if it shows the dust that's gathered.

Chris and Julie are known for their unpretentious, direct approach — no grand theatricals, simply two voices and instruments conversing with an audience — and the ambient calm of St Andrew's doesn't prevent their performance becoming vibrant, vivacious and alive.

Throughout the evening, the balance between the duo feels effortless. Chris (vocals, guitar, banjo, dulcimer, percussion) and Julie (vocals, piano, guitar, mandolin, bouzouki) alternate lead lines, harmonies and instrumental interludes with a trust that comes only after many years of collaboration. Every pause is meaningful, every overlapping harmony a conversation and every lyrical turn an invitation to be emotionally involved.

The song Gone Girl Gone, for example, unfolds with a bittersweet undertow about absence, departure and the ache of loss that reaches out to everyone who has ever lost love. In their hands this is not a melodrama, however, but something quieter, more observant: the hush between words, the soft slide of a chord change, the little hesitation in a vocal line adding poignancy. The audience leans forward in sympathy, caught by the emotional weight that lies beneath simplicity.



Midway through the concert, they turn to *The Waiting Room*, a song that has become a kind of emblem of hope and patience in their repertoire. When they had first revealed it, on Radio 2 and sang it to the person who inspired it, it was already clear that it carried more than melody. In St Andrew's, in that hushed space, it feels like a prayer: a reach out towards meaning in uncertainty, underscored by delicate piano, gentle guitar, and their voices holding steady, as

though to insist that waiting can itself be a form of strength.

From there, Women of the World takes on a communal urgency. The song's message of solidarity, voice, strength in tribulation resonates richly. Chris sings with warmth and clarity, Julie harmonises with quiet power. At times, the audience seems to join in mid-verse, as if drawn into the circle of composition. The lines: And you will rise up, rise and hold the sky up, and we'll all hear your voices, lingers long after the final notes have faded.

As though saving a quiet triumph for the close, they offer *Kalamazoo* near the end of the set. This song, inspired by the story of the women who built instruments in the Gibson guitar factory during the Second World War, carries historical weight and celebrating a tough spirit, with its narrative: 70 proud women from *Kalamazoo*, why would you hide what women can do felt especially poignant, as the Gibson company always denied making guitars during

the war. The chorus rises sure and proud and, for a few moments, the church seems to pulse with recognition and tribute.

There are moments of hushed silence between songs, appreciative sighs, and, finally at the end, sustained applause. In a post-concert goodbye, Chris and Julie thank everyone for a lovely gig in a beautiful church... a great atmosphere. How could we disagree? It's just the place to be on a chilly autumn evening.

The next concert Imaginary Landscapes will be something different – a fusion of words and music bringing together the poetry of Chris Tutton, acclaimed author, performer and raconteur, with the semi improvised harp brilliance of international award-winning harpist, Lucy Nolan.
