"Let's make Hope normal again"

It's no coincidence that as the nights grow longer, we step into a new season themed with light and hope. Advent is a gift. It's an antidote to the rush and pressures of pre-Christmas. It asks us to slow down and step off the treadmill, so we can reset and remind ourselves what's really important about this time of year. It asks us to wait patiently so we can savour the joy of expectation.

It's a time, in the words of Jack Polanski, leader of the Green Party, when we commit ourselves to making hope 'normal again.'

It's so much easier to despair in these times; to bury our heads and feel overwhelmed by the increasing unkindness of the world. To make hope normal again, we have to invest in the power of kindness. We have to dare to believe that every small kindness and every prayer is in fact a light in the darkness.

Richard Haughton Threlfall (15.02.1937 – 8.10.2025)

Richard was a well respected, popular member of our church who attented regularly with Rachel even when his mobility was not too good. Below is just a reflection of the man he was as we've picked out some of the key memories from the moving family eulogy at his Celebration service.

Richard grew up in Godmanchester, near Huntingdon in a house with frontage onto the Great Ouse. His father a local dentist, introduced him to sailing which became a life long love spending hours sailing the river and also proudly as a rowing cox on the Ouse.

He attended Oundle school, where he was a handy boxer but rugby became his second sporting love playing for various clubs including Bedford, Hemel Hempstead Camelot and Rosslyn Park, posting his kit home to be washed but when he it was suggested he needed to train more he knew his playing days were coming to an end!

On leaving school he trained as an Architect and went to the world renowned Architect Association in Bedford Square London for his seven years of training. For some of his training he lived with his Grandmother in Abbots Langley, and at a village fete he was introduced to Rachel and eventually they were married in 1962.

A few weeks later they moved to Australia, as Richard's training required practical work experience, but returned to England in 1964 and moved to Islington. They started sailing at Burnham on Crouch, Essex as members of the Royal Corinthian Yacht Club and this started a lifelong association with the town and the sailing community.

Sarah and Paul were born in Islington and in 1970 they moved to Queens Road Hertford where Tig was born soon afterwards.

Richard & Rachel soon settled into the local community and one place they quickly became active in was St Andrews Church. The 9.15am Sunday Service has been an important part of their lives ever since and when the parishes joined together and the 9.15am service was moved to St Marys, they moved too, some habits can't be changed! But in both Churches, they have been welcomed and made many friends.

Richard Haughton Threlfall

Richard's proffessional skills as an architect were soon a great asset not only for St Andrew's church but in the local community as well as the work he did in London. In the 1970's local communities realised their environment needed protecting and Richard quickly became a committee member of Hertford Civic Society. He was involved in the redevelopment of Hertford but also the protection of our buildings by getting them listed status. In the 80/90's Richard and his team also converted the old malt houses in Stanstead Abbotts into small industrial units which in itself helped the malting business to thrive.

In 1976 Richard & Rachel jumped at the opportunity to move to a bigger house in Mangrove Road which was better for the family and enabled them to fulfil more of their love of gardening.

Richards love of rugby continued after his playing days by doing some coaching at Hertford Rugby Club which started the families long association with the club which continues today

Having helped save the Heart of Hertford, Richards next big challenge was helping preserve the 2* listed landscape, designed by Humphry Repton, of Panshanger Park. In 1980 a planning application was submitted to extract gravel from the park. Permission was eventually granted but importantly many conditions were applied to limit the damage to the listed landscape and timelines were set for the park to be opened to the public. Ever since those decisions Richard and various others had pushed Tarmac to honour their legal obligations, and eventually in 2013 this led to the formation of the Friends of Panshanger to unite all these groups to work in partnership with Tarmac. Richard was of course on the committee, ensuring the buildings and landscapes were correctly preserved. The park is now open to the public and enjoyed by thousands of people walking, running and enjoying the splendour of Humphry Repton's design.

So this illustrates how much Richard did and achieved for our local community. But he will also be remembered by his friends and family as a loving, supportive, caring person who was always there for them

We will miss you Richard. God Bless you and rest in peace

St. Mary's Churchyard Regulations - Christmas

We are very conscious that this is a sensitive area — and we are most grateful for the care shown by many people tending graves and memorial plaques — but as Churchwardens we are required to ensure that the regulations, as laid down by the diocese relating to the churchyard are adhered to. The rules relating to churchyards are very stringent compared to those applying to local authority cemeteries. The full regulations are displayed on one of the noticeboards inside the South Door porch.


We would therefore ask that you remember that the placing of the likes of Father Christmases, Reindeers, flashing lights and so on, on graves/plaques is not permitted. Similarly floral remembrances should consist of natural flowers. Also, please do not use glass vases or jars as they might be accidentally broken leading to difficulties when maintaining the churchyard.

Whilst we should be reluctant to do so, we will, if necessary, remove items. We would always be happy to explain our reason for doing so and give advice about what is permitted.



Remembrance Sunday at St Mary's & Birch Green Memorial







Once again it was a special time of Remembrance for those who sacrificed their lives in war and conflict. Services both in church and at the memorial in Birch Green were well attended and the bells at St Mary's were rung semi muffled to show our respect. Below is the sermon, slightly edited, given by Rev Alan.

Silence & Peacemaking

On the website of the Imperial War Museum, you'll find a sound recording of the actual moment ceasefire was declared on Armistice Day 1918. Recorded on the eleventh day of the eleventh month at the eleventh hour, a barrage of heavy gunfire gives way to a silence where all that can be heard is birdsong.

Silence. This morning, we will stand for two minutes in silence; 120 seconds of sacred pause in all this noise and busyness and distraction. Two minutes to remember; to recall countless lives given and taken. Two minutes to reflect on both the light and the darkness of this human race; the potential in every one of us both to create and to destroy.

Silence because there are no words with which to pay appropriate respect. Silence because we are left speechless at both the sacrifice and the atrocity of war. Silence because in silence there is solidarity and connection.

Silence helps us to connect both with our shared humanity, and with what lies deep within us. In silence we hear ourselves.

Silence, we know, can be good for us. It can calm the nervous system, reduce stress hormones, lower blood pressure, improve sleep. But it can also be scary.

In those sound archives you will also find the stories of those who were present at the ceasefire; "Well do you know, strangely enough' one man recalls, 'we wept, because the silence was so awful. You see we'd been used to the noise of guns, all day long, all day long, all day long...it was so strange, to have silence."

A strange and awful silence.

Silence & Peacemaking

Many returning home from war of course, with what we now know as PTSD, carried with them that awful silence, refusing to speak of the horrors they'd experienced. A coping mechanism; a way too perhaps of shielding those at home.

Some of us are more comfortable with silence than others. Some of us need noise; the TV, the radio, our phones. And that's not wrong. Sometimes however it's a coping mechanism; a distraction to avoid the things we can't or don't want to face.

Monks and mystics understand this. They have an expression 'Your cell will teach you everything'. The cell is silence. Last summer, as I've previously mentioned, I spent five days on silent retreat, by mistake.

Silent meals, no TV, no music, no distraction. Just me, myself and I. And at first it was wonderful, letting go of all the responsibility you don't know you're carrying until you put it down. And then boredom kicked in. And then frustration. And then... some stuff I'd carefully suppressed began to rise up in the silence; uncomfortable stuff, unresolved stuff, some painful stuff. In the silence I began to hear myself. I began to see some of what I still needed to make peace with.

Famously, Jesus once said 'blessed are the peacemakers, because they will be called children of God' Peacemaking, as we know, begins with making peace within ourselves; with our past, with those things that we too often distract ourselves from. And when we do this, well then, that peace spreads because we then begin to see that others, *every* other, including those who have wounded us, is also a child of God.

Last Remembrance Sunday I shared with you a little of my own story, my own trauma of losing a brother to violence in my homeland in the North of Ireland.

This summer, as you probably know, I visited a road in Belfast I've never been to before. The Falls Road has always felt like a no-go place for Protestants like me. It is for many the heartland of Irish Republicanism and the scene of historic conflict and trauma for the Catholic community who live there.

Barbara, a longtime resident, was our tour guide. She was about my age, full of fun and laughter, and she spoke powerfully and vulnerably about her own experience of growing up in the Troubles. As we walked the streets lined with political murals and visited the Peace Line, that barrier that still separates this community from their Protestant neighbours in the Shankhill, Barbara spoke of her own costly journey of making peace with her past and the work of reconciliation she was involved with. She mentioned that the one group of people she could not yet forgive were the RUC, the Royal Ulster Constabulary, the then police force of N Ireland. Officers had victimized and shot members of her family at close range with plastic bullets. As I listened, I felt torn and conflicted. You see my brother was in the RUC and the IRA killed him because he was in their eyes a 'legitimate target' in their struggle against what they experienced as a foreign occupation.

Barbara and I took a few moments away from the group, to walk and talk. And I shared with her that traumatic chapter of my family's story. And as we walked and talked and listened, that whole 'us versus them' thing just disappeared. This was two wounded people meeting on the common ground of human trauma. And before we parted, Barbara asked for a hug. And in that moment, near that Peace Line barricade, another little wall came down and a kind of peace broke through to us both.

Silence & Peacemaking

In this silence of Remembrance Sunday, may we take time to hear ourselves; to allow what's unresolved or damaged in us to surface, knowing that just as God (however you understand that word) was and is in the trenches and killing fields of war, so, he is also with each one of us in whatever battleground of the mind or heart we find ourselves in. This is a God who knows from personal experience what trauma is; a God who is in the business of breaking down barricades and building peace; a God who is, I believe, here... in this moment, in this and in every silence.

Eco Church

Taking care of our natural world was a big focus of our Eco Church exhibition last month. So in this issue, we'd like to share some of the ways in which our members care for nature, at home and in our amazing nature reserves.

Geoff Oates shares some thoughts:

"Some seed fell among the stony ground"

Many years ago we planted violas in a pot at our kitchen door, as part of a bright array of spring blooms. The following year, violas appeared along the edge of the lawn and in the cracks between the paving stones. Spontaneous re-wilding. A strip of lawn was left unmown, the paving unweeded, until they faded.

Each spring they have reappeared. They have even re-seeded themselves into plant pots, completing the cycle!

This year, one little clump of these bright, cheeky blooms had held out against the dry spring, the summer heat and the first autumn chills in its sheltered spot below the doorstep, safe from the tread of boots and shoes. They greet me each morning as I leave to work and each evening as I return.

We must be one of very few families that water the 'weeds' in the cracks between the paving stones, but they are our daily parable of the beauty, surprise and resilience of God's creation

Kath Oates reflects on some wild neighbours

A few weeks ago I noticed a large number of bees buzzing just above the ground over our lawn. For the next few days they kept coming back, especially when the sun was shining. Each time they made their way up and down the lawn as if they were looking for something.

A few days later I noticed a number of holes in the lawn, which looked like mini volcano craters.

You can see two of them in the photo. I wondered if the bees and the holes were connected in some way.

A bit of research led to the discovery that the bees were mining bees, solitary bees who don't form colonies but whose females build nests by excavating tunnels into the ground. The "volcanoes" I saw was the soil resulting from their excavations.

I also found out that their burrowing doesn't harm the lawn and that it actually helps with aeration and drainage and that the piles of soil soon disappear. Burrowing bees are also good pollinators and don't sting people or pets.

The bees have now gone but I look forward to meeting their offspring next year!

Friends of Panshanger Park

Panshanger Park is a wonderful natural area within our wider community and so the Friends of Panshanger Park are sharing some of it's history - some of which will include the village and greens and some not.

This month Kate Harwood looks at the paintings and visuals of the Panshanger estate as we moved into the era where photography would inevitably take over

Painting Panshanger

The first pictures we have of the Panshanger estate show the grand house at Cole Green built by the 1st Earl at the beginning of the 18th century. However, these are only mason's elevations. The landscape doesn't appear until the end of the century when we have a charming view of the landscape as remodelled by Capability Brown in the mid-18th century. This view has now gone with the demolition of the Cole Green House but the pool still remains, along with some of the old oaks from the avenue. Other work by John Charnock is held in the National Maritime Museum and by Henry George Oldfield at HALS, both of the Cole Green House and Panshanger house before the new one was built in the early 19th century.

In 1799 Humphry Repton was commissioned to re-landscape the larger Panshanger landscape which now included the old Cole Green one. His Red Book of that year consists of nine illustrations of ideas for house and landscape, including 'before' and 'after' versions showing how much better the landscape would be if his advice was followed. As often in his Red Books he depicts himself in his customary blue coat showing the improved landscape to a diligent sketcher of the scene. The Chisel Shelf Ride has 'stations' where splendid views of the landscape across the valley to the tree line on the north are visible. These often have two signal trees at the Chisel Ride stop to frame the opening in the woods and a tree in the centre of the view to divide it into two. These 'stations' were designed, and used at other sites, to provide somewhere to stop your carriage and take out your sketch book to produce a 'Picturesque' composition which could, if wished, be worked up with paint later on.

In 1841 Caleb Stanley Robert Stanley, as part of Queen Victoria's entourage, stayed at Panshanger and drew three views, from the house across the Broadwater, of the front garden

and from Chisel Shelf towards the house. This last was copied by W.H. Taylor, printed by C. Hullmandel, and sold as a lithograph [Pic 1]. Sadly the great Edward Adveno Brooke did not include a full-colour painting (Pic 2) of the Panshanger gardens in his volume *The Gardens of England* (1856) but did include a sketch of the Panshanger Terrace with text explaining that the plants indicated in the long beds under the windows were scarlet geraniums.

Some Victorian families had enthusiastic amateur artists amongst their children who painted and sketched their gardens and park. If the Panshanger families did paint the park, then we have not come across their work. The one documented artist at Panshanger was Katrine, Countess to the 7th Earl who had a studio there and was an accomplished woodcarver, credited with the carvings on the panelling at Mayflower Place. We know that the Cowper family were great collectors of art with their legacy from the Earl of Grantham and the collection amassed by the 3rd Earl in Italy, and that they regularly loaned out pieces for temporary exhibitions, including aground-breaking one at Manchester which was not for the elite but the ordinary man.

By the 1840s, photography was just starting to become popular and we have a wealth of photographs from the later 19th century until today. The include those in *Country Life, Illustrated London News*, Sales Catalogues and Historic England's 'Red Boxes', as well as postcards and many individual snaps

Fewer paintings or sketches survive after the advent of photography, although the charming painting by Elsie Graham, aged 11, in 1897 of the creepers on the garden front of the house does [Pic 3].

A notable artist at Panshanger was Spencer Gore whose mother and sister lived in Hertingfordbury. A founder of the Camden Town Group of artists (many of whom actually lived in Letchworth) he painted a number of views of the Panshanger landscape which are held in galleries from Hitchin (were much of the group's Letchworth work is held) to New South Wales. The Group had a distinctive range of colours in the palette they used – a different way of seeing Panshanger perhaps. [Pic 4]








Volunteers needed to open/close St. Mary's



WALTER WALLINGER CHARITY

Walter Wallinger died in 1709 leaving "Four hundred pounds for the placing of poor children of this Parish as Apprentices."

Times have moved on and the trustees of the charity now take the view that the income from the endowment should be used to give grants for educational purposes to people under 25 who have for at least two years lived, or been educated, within the ancient parish of Hertingfordbury which today roughly means Hertingfordbury village and the five Greens and outlying houses.

Something of the order of £1500 is available annually. Typically grants are one-off payments not exceeding £450 for something that will help with the applicant's education in a broad sense, such as a musical instrument, specialist equipment, a field or other course. Grants are available to anyone in school, FE or Higher Education.


